



Native Garden Coming To Villa Mira Monte

The Morgan Hill Historical Society has been hosting "Living History" field trips for local schools in the Morgan Hill school district, as well as private schools, since 2011. The program serves 800—900 students and parents each year. During the 3 1/2 hour field trip, Morgan Hill Historical Society docents guide students through the Museum, the Morgan Hill House and the Centennial History Trail; the entire site is known as Villa Mira Monte. A docent visits the classroom prior to the field trip to provide in-depth information and hands-on activities related to the original Native American inhabitants, the Amah Mutsun.

As part of the field trip, the Morgan Hill Historical Society would like to honor and demonstrate how the land was used by the Native Americans long before the Spaniards, Mexicans and settlers arrived.

To that end, the Morgan Hill Historical Society successfully wrote a grant to South Valley Fleurs Garden Club to fund establishing a Native Garden on the site.

With encouragement from members of the Bay Area Open Space Council, and the Amah Mutsun tribe, the Morgan Hill Historical Society is in the process of planting a garden that will contain grasses, bushes, flowers and fruit that were used for food, medicine, hunting and fishing by the Native people.

The first planting of soap root took place on May 2, 2019 at the entrance of Villa Mira Monte. Master Gardener, John Jenkins, a member of South Valley Fleurs Garden Club, was on hand to offer advice, and direct and participate in the planting. He also planted deer grass at the front of entrance walkway on May 22nd.

Soap root was used by the local Amah Mutsun tribal members: they ate the young leaves, slow roasted the bulbs and ate them like potatoes, rubbed the bulbs to produce lather to clean clothes/baskets, roasted bulbs to produce a substance to glue feathers to arrow shafts, and to treat rashes like poison oak. Soap root was boiled in water to be used as a dye, it was a remedy for dandruff and the dried outer coats of bulbs were used as brushes. The MHHS Museum has examples of the brushes.

The Morgan Hill Historical Society wishes to promote using native plants that were used by the Amah Mutsun and has invited the University of California UC Master Gardeners, Santa Clara County, to our July 20th Community Picnic & Youth Mariachi Competition. The Master Gardeners have been asked to provide an informational table, manned by Master Gardeners, to offer information to members of the community to find out how to participate in creating their own new home gardens. The goal is to teach classes and provide guidance on the "how to" of growing fresh, healthy food for low income and/or minority community members inside their own apartments, homes and backyards.

Morgan Hill Historical Society Field Trip Experience | Garners Awards

On May 3-5, our own Field Trip Program received award recognitions at the Delta Kappa Gamma California Convention held at the San Francisco Airport Marriott Waterfront. Delta Kappa Gamma International is an organization of more than 90,000 key women educators in 18 countries and works to promote excellence in education. Terri and Tom Hennessey were honored for their community service with the field trip program. Tom and Terri Hennessey are two of the most valuable people helping to provide our interactive, child-centered visit to the Morgan Hill Historical Society's Villa Mira Monte. Terri works over time collaborating our program with Kat Napoli and the Amah Mutsun Trunk Show visit prior to the class's arrival for their field trip. Terri finds and schedules docents that ensure a successful and meaningful visit to the museum. She helps procure materials, supplies, and

artifacts used in the program. And she runs and keeps up-to-date binders for our docents. Terri and Tom both set-up all supplies, tables, chairs, artifacts, costumes, and consumable materials used for the hands-on program. They both donate hundreds of hours to the program including Tom being our resident butler and kitchen butler, Mr. Tom. This field trip program would not happen without the Hennessey's devotion to its success. The local Chapter of DKG, Gamma Alpha, was honored to nominate Tom and Terri for the Service to the Community Award.

Our Field Trip Program began in the fall of 2010 by Loritta Bonfonte Johnson, Jennifer Tate, Margaret Rodrigues and her grandchildren, Cole and Caitlin Meusel. Over the years, the core group of retired teachers and community members have helped the program based on the Social Studies National Core Curricular Standards. The program includes activities that can be achieved by all students and can be expanded to involve deep, thoughtful questions and speculations. Therefore, this year it was awarded the At-risk Youth Award from DKG. We are very proud that our Field Trip Experience was recognized with two awards at the State Convention. We are always looking for new volunteers to help continue this worthwhile experience for the students of Morgan Hill.

A Docent's Experience At Mount Umunhum

Oh dear Newsletter readers, I must recount a recent adventure that you MUST write on your Bucket List!! Have you ever experienced Mount Umunhum? If no, then you absolutely have to visit this lovely, sacred place. On the summit of this mountain, the Amah-Mutsun people have celebrated the Creator for thousands of generations and still do. Umunhum translates to "Resting place of the hummingbird", a prominent creature in their creation story.

Forgive me, I do digress. The trip up to the summit is along a narrow, winding road with some blind curves; bicyclists also enjoy this road, so watch for them. Anyway, one eventually reaches the summit parking lot where there is a wonderful guide awaiting. In our case, it was Bashim Jaber, an extremely

knowledgeable young man we followed for an hour, listening to facts and stories. He first recounted the history of the Almaden Air Force Station which occupied the site between 1957 and 1980. The radar tower, visible over the entire Santa Clara Valley and beyond, was part of the Early Warning Defense System; here they watched for incoming Russian planes during the Cold War. Airmen watched the radar screens for 24 hours a day, keeping our country safe. Family housing, a recreation center, commissary, and a swimming pool served the needs of those stationed here. Beginning in 2009, all buildings were demolished, hazardous waste materials cleaned up, and the land restored to its natural state. Even the native plants have been replanted from collected seed.

The Sierra Azul Open Space Preserve now takes care of the mountain, keeping it in pristine condition. The wildflowers, lavender, pink, yellow, are small due to the serpentine soil with few nutrients. The trees are plentiful and small also. The views are unbelievable; San Jose, Morgan Hill, Santa Cruz, Coyote Valley, and, on a clear day, the Pacific Ocean, are all visible. The ceremonial circle on the summit is still used by the Amah-Mutsun. If you visit on the right day, you can witness their celebratory dance. Just GO, you won't be sorry!! Memories of a Small Town Girl, Growing Up In Morgan Hill, California

Imagine sitting on the front porch swing with your favorite grandmother, listening to her stories about growing up in the 1930s and 1940s in a small, rather rural, town. She tells you all about her family, her friends, what they did, and the mischief they got into in the "olden days". This is the feeling you get reading Jean Pinard's book.

Wineries of Santa Clara Valley

From the Introduction: "The wineries of Santa Clara Valley have a rich history, dating back to the 1700s. First came the Spaniards (1777), then the Frenchmen (mid-1800s), and finally the Italians (1880)." "Immigrants from around the world, following the American dream, were soon lured to the Santa Clara Valley for its rich soil and ideal growing climate. These immigrants brought centuries of wine making traditions, passed down through the generations. This book highlights the stories and photographs of eight of our Santa Clara Valley wineries whose histories date back to the 1800s."

The wineries depicted in words and photos are Guglielmo Winery, Ross Vineyards and Winery, Hecker Pass Winery, Fernwood Cellars, Solis Winery, Fortino Winery, Morgan Hill Cellars, and Kirigin Cellars. "This historical collection of photographs is a fascinating account of how the sacrifice and indomitable spirit of these people made a lasting impact on the wineries of Santa Clara Valley."

The photographs of the families are wonderful!

South Santa Clara County

by Sam Shueh, 127 pages, 2008, \$20

This book is a pictorial history of the South Santa Clara County towns of Morgan Hill, Gilroy, and San Martin. The photographs also depict Coyote, Madrone, Pacheco Pass, agriculture, trains and depots, schools, and celebrations and events. "Sam Shueh has been documenting the changes in southern Santa Clara County for the last 30 years. Many of the vintage images are from Shueh's personal collection. Others are rare postcards – rare because most of these communities were sparsely populated then and are still rural today and not often captured in postcard format."

Come check this one out – especially the photo of Beth Wyman on p. 69! If you have lived in Morgan Hill for awhile, you know Beth.

Growing up with two younger sisters before and during WWII in Morgan Hill, meant close and lasting friendships developed within the community. The times meant rationing and scarcity of things we consider essential today – like gasoline! Relatives were always around and everyone helped each other, whether it was taking care of each others children, giving a family a place to live, or a job.

I think Jean's story is one typical of her times. At 12 she and her sisters and friends worked picking prunes all summer for her parents' friends. She babysat, learned to play the piano, and had a great deal of fun playing games with friends.

Her story is also about her evolution from a little girl wanting to please her father to a strong woman who graduated from San Jose State College, and eventually becoming a teacher at Walsh Elementary and Principal at Burnett School and, later, Nordstrom Elementary.

Old family photos chronicle the growth of Jean, her sisters, and their friends. Now 91 years old, Jean writes at the end of her book, "I have discovered that life is full of unexpected wonders, and I look forward to my next surprise with anticipation."

Look for Jean on the dance floor, doing the Charleston, at the Prohibition Party at Morgan Hill House on June 22!






